

Robert Davidson, Eagle of the Dawn: Northwest Coast Master On exhibit: April 1 – June 11, 2008

An exhibition of sculpture, works on paper, hide drums, cloth, copper, and woven spruce-root basketry by renowned Haida artist Robert Davidson. Davidson is only the second First Nations artist to have a solo show at the National Gallery of Canada in Ottawa. He has also been essential to the 20th-century renaissance of Haida culture and has been awarded three honorary doctorates and the prestigious Order of Canada in 1996 in recognition of his artistic and cultural achievements. Works by Reg Davidson, Claude Davidson, Robert Davidson Sr. and Charles Edenshaw will also be on display. http://gormanmuseum.ucdavis.edu

It was announced that Ed Thomas was elected by unanimous consent to be Central Council President Emeritus. A repatriation ceremony also took place at the dinner. On day four, 43 resolutions were presented, and the elections were completed. Our adopted nephew,

Tom Wheaters, also attended the convention, which was so special to us.

Harold Jacobs, of Central Council, worked to repatriate four articles that were presented to the clan leaders in a ceremony during a dinner at the Annual General Assembly in Juneau. A Chilkat Tunic was presented to Nora Dauenhauer to be returned to the village of Klukwan. La Verne Wise was presented a Chilkat Tunic belonging to the Disheetann Clan to be returned to Sitka. A Chilkat Blanket, with a killer whale design and a head dress belonging to the Naanyaa.aayi Clan was presented to John Felller to be returned to Wrangell. It was great when the Matriarch of the Naanyaa.aayi clan asked those of us present to escort the blanket out, so we



danced out with John Feller. Harold Jacobs continues to locate our Native regalia that is in many Museum's through out the country

One of our own recipiants of the San Francisco T & H Scholarship, Morrigan Shaw will be graduating with the Bachelors of Art

in American Indian Studies just finalized this semester. She is the first student to have completed these requirements at San Francisco State University. In recognition of both grades and personal contributions to the community, Morrigan has been selected as this year's Hood Recipient by the College of Ethnic Studies.

Every May, of the 8,000 students graduating, 1 Hood Recipient is chosen to represent their fellow students from each of SFSU's eight academic colleges. The Hood Recipients, who wear symbolic hoods at Commencement, are outstanding students with unique stories and ambitious plans for the future.

The actual graduation date, including the hooding ceremony, is Saturday May 24 at 12 pm, Cox Stadium, SF State University and tickets are limited. To be eligible, you must be enrolled with Tlingit/Haida Central Council and registered with San Francisco Community Council. You must be attending a university, college or trade school. If you are a high school student, you may also apply for scholarship. High school students must successfully complete high school, and be enrolled in a college or trade school before being given the money. Until then, the money sits in an account. You may apply all four years of high school, which could potentially add up!

For any interested scholarship applicants, here is a list of what needs to be collected while you request an official application form:

- 1. Transcripts of all studies taken beyond high school.
- 2. Official high school transcripts IF you have not completed at least

one full year of study beyond the high school level.

- 3. A letter of recommendation from a faculty Counselor.
- 4. A letter of recommendation from an employer or professional

Associate. If you have not had significant professional employment, The letter may be from a clan leader, a community leader, or Clergyperson with whom you are personally acquainted.

5. A short essay on your goals and ambitions--tell us about you!
